DUATHLON

Sancta Maria promotes fitness and health by becoming involved in a wide and challenging variety of sporting events and activities. The school recognises the need for all to lead an active and healthy life. The physical activities being organised have a number of benefits for people including improving mental health and reducing stress and anxiety. In the process much needed funds are raised for chosen charities.

One such event to be held in the school was a Duathlon. A staff member Ms Clare McDermott together with a number of her teaching colleagues organised the event which took place on Friday 26th March last. Training had been taking place among staff and students in previous weeks in preparation for the event.



The Duathlon consisted of a 5 km run from Old Head beach to Sancta Maria College followed by a 10 km cycle from the school via Kilgeever, Kilsallagh, Falduff and finished back in Sancta Maria College. Proceeds from this event go to St Jude's orphanage in Gulu in Northern Uganda. Ms Clare McDermott has spent time working in the orphanage on a voluntary basis recently. The orphanage is located in Gulu, a region in Northern Uganda. For the past 20 years Northern Uganda has been affected by a prolonged civil conflict. Now that the fighting has ceased, funds are needed to help people resettle in their villages following the conflict. St. Judes is home to over 80 children orphaned for various reasons.


Transition Year students participated in surfing lessons which were organised by the Mayo Surf School.

IRISH ONLINE

Sancta Maria has decided to explore new developments in ICT and combine it with the Irish language in the classroom. Abair Leat! is being used in conjunction with the Department of Education and Science in a pilot scheme across a number of second level schools of which Sancta Maria College, is proud to be part of. AbairLeat is an online interactive programme which enables students to develop their Irish language and IT skills at school and on their home PC's. With the use of an interactive series of games/activities and theme books this format has proven to be a fun and effective way of learning Irish in the classroom. Each task for the individual student is organised into chapters and has an assessment page which reviews each learner. The teacher assigns and allocates homework to each student online. Students complete homework via the homework link. Parents are also part of the interactive learning and have their own login facility to view the homework assignments.



SCIENCE IN SANCTA MARIA

Science is offered as a core subject to all Junior Cycle students. Biology, Chemistry, Agricultural Science and Physics /Chemistry are offered at Senior Cycle level. Amidst a declining environment four Transition Year students have orchestrated a groundbreaking campaign for the "One Good Idea" environment competition and recently emerged as one of twenty groups in the National Final on the 6th May in Dublin Castle. The group, which consists of Jack Bowler, Cathal Gunning, Stephen Henry and Jake Stanton, represent the only school in Mayo to reach the final.


"One Good Idea" is a Sustainable Energy Authority of Ireland (SEAI) initiative environmental competition. It is for secondary school students whose aim is to run a campaign raising awareness about climate change and the ways it can be tackled by using energy more efficiently and making changes in the way we live, work and travel.

The group aimed their campaign at primary school children and focused their efforts on everyday energy saving. The project went through many intricate stages from the groundwork, which included researching and planning, all the way through to implementing the campaign at Murrisk National School, Lecanvey National School and Louisburgh National School. The group made an energy saving superhero stand up prop, aptly named Enviroman, which the campaign revolved around. They also designed an original environmental board game, quizzes, a website, social network sites, bookmarks and handmade t-shirts, all of which promote energy awareness in a fun and interactive way.

The whole campaign was driven by the group's deep rooted determination to improve the present state of our environment and combat climate change. Numerous problems arise from excessive energy use: it causes air pollution, acid rain, contributes to climate change, destroys the rainforests and other wild habitats and is a pivotal factor in the decline and extinction of thousands of species of animals and plants. These problems coupled with the fact that we, as humans, play a huge role in climate change galvanized the group's determination. To help the environment we can all realize greener alternatives in our everyday activities, such as:

1. Reducing the brightness on your TV and computer

- monitor so it uses less energy.
- 2. Turn off lights when you leave a room.
- 3. Cut vegetables into smaller pieces so they cook quicker.
- 4. When cooking put the lid on the pot so food cooks auicker.
- 5. Make sure the pan covers the ring completely to avoid energy being wasted.
- 6. Turn off all appliances if going on holiday.
- 7. Only boil the amount of water needed in the kettle.
- 8. Use energy efficient light bulbs.

PROJECT MATHS

Teachers from the school have participated in in-service training for the new revised Mathematics syllabus. Project Maths involves the introduction of revised syllabuses for both Junior and Leaving Certificate Mathematics. It involves changes to what students learn in mathematics, how they learn it and how they will be assessed.

Project Maths aims to provide for an enhanced student learning experience and greater levels of achievement for all. Much greater emphasis will be placed on student understanding of mathematical concepts, with increased use of contexts and applications that will enable students to relate mathematics to everyday experience.

The initiative will also focus on developing students' problemsolving skills. Assessment will reflect the different emphasis on understanding and skills in the teaching and learning of mathematics.

The Mathematics syllabuses will be introduced in strands as follows:

- 1. Statistics and Probability 2. Geometry and Trigonometry
- 3. Number 4. Algebra 5. Functions

According as the revised strands are introduced, students will experience mathematics in a new way, using examples and applications that are meaningful for them. These will also allow students to appreciate how mathematics relates to daily life and to the world of work. Students will develop skills in analysing, interpreting and presenting mathematical information; in logical reasoning and argument, and in applying their mathematical knowledge and skills to solve familiar and unfamiliar problems. In the junior cycle, a more investigative approach will be used which will build on and extend students' experience of mathematics in the primary school. To provide better continuity with primary school mathematics, a bridging framework is being developed that links the various strands of mathematics in the primary school to topics in the Junior Certificate mathematics syllabuses. In the senior cycle, students' experience of mathematics will

enable them to develop the knowledge and skills necessary for their future lives as well as for further study in areas that rely on mathematics. Leaving Certificate Mathematics will be provided at three syllabus levels, Foundation, Ordinary and Higher, with corresponding levels of examination papers.
